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1. SEDATION AS A CONTINUUM

Sedation is a drug-induced depression of consciousness, a continuum starting at minimal sedation and culminating in general anaesthesia.

2. SEDATION GUIDELINES

In 2013, the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges issued cross specialty recommendations for standards for sedation practice in adults.

- Defines Fundamental Standards and Development Standards
- Recommends competency-based formal training for all healthcare professionals involved in sedation



In 2021, the guidelines issued by the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges were updated:




- Reinforcing standards for practice
- Requiring competency-based formal training for all healthcare professionals involved in sedation
- Setting out a compliance template.

3. SEDATIVE MEDICATIONS

In order to achieve the level of moderate sedation, typically two sedative medications are administered: an opioid for analgesia and a benzodiazepine for anxiety. The interaction between these two drugs results in a positive synergistic interaction which means that the joint action of the 2 agents is greater than the sum of their individual effects.

By combining small doses of several drugs that interact synergistically, each drug's therapeutic action is potentiated while the side effects of each are minimized because of the small doses used.



These drugs are administered using a technique of titration to effect - where small doses are administered, waiting two minutes between each administration to assess the impact on the patient, until a level of moderate sedation is achieved.







4. MONITORING SEDATION PRACTICE

Clinical and instrumental monitoring to a degree relevant to the patient's medical status and the sedation method, must be used.

Level of Sedation

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In moderate sedation, patients respond purposefully to verbal commands, either alone or accompanied by light tactile stimulation.

Regular communication with patients assures patients don't reach below a Alertness in Sedated Patient (ASP) score below 2.

Respiratory & Cardiovascular



Monitoring used for all patients should include at least pulse oximetry. In addition, when the patient is in a deeper plane of sedation than minimal sedation, the following should be used:

- Capnography
- ECG
- Automated non-invasive BP



5. AUDITING SEDATION PRACTICE



Keeping a logbook and regularly auditing sedation is a fundamental standard required by the guidelines to enable quality improvement and ensure best practice.


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
